

Police Department

The Colstrip Police Department would like to take the opportunity through the city newsletter to warn the community about several unscrupulous scams that have attempted to defraud our citizens. Scam artists have used the internet, the telephone, and U.S. mail in an attempt to get money from Colstrip residents. Here are some of the things to be aware of:

- (1) You receive an internet letter saying you have come into **SUDDEN RICHES**. They say you have won a foreign lottery or sweepstakes. **REALITY:** But that's impossible unless you traveled to that country to enter, since it's illegal to buy or sell tickets across the U.S. border.
- (2) The notice comes by regular mail, phone, fax, or email. **REALITY:** If you had won a cash prize or inherited money, you would be notified by certified mail.
- (3) You receive a letter often in response to an email including an enclosed check for **MORE** than the amount they say you won. They want you to correct their "MISTAKE" by depositing the money and sending them a cashiers check or money order for the difference. **REALITY:** The checks although they look real are actually fakes, forgeries, or even in some cases stolen. You deposit the money and send them a good check and by the time your bank notifies you the deposit as "bounced" it is too late to cancel your good check. You are out the money and very possibly responsible to the bank to make good on the entire amount deposited.
- (4) You think you have found someone special online and they want to be your friend and even promise to travel to the U.S. to be with you. **REALITY:** You have been duped. There is no way you know what the person on the other end of the email looks like, who they really are or where they really live. If you start to send them money, as they often request, they will find reasons to ask for more including claiming they were in need of medical care or more travel money. The scam ends when you don't hear anything more from them, or you receive an email saying your new pen pal was killed

Animal Control



The new dog and cat licenses are now on sale at Colstrip City Hall! Get yours before the February 29th deadline. Beginning March 1st a \$5.00 late fee will be assessed to each license. These tags are the fastest way we have to reunite animal and owner.

This is the time of year we usually see some real Montana winter and I hope all of you that leave your pets outside have taken the necessary precautions to ensure their warmth and safety. Animals **MUST** have food and water (not frozen) at all times. If you are not home during the day be sure your animal has a five gallon bucket at room temperature (or slightly warmer but not cold) water in the morning when you leave for work and make sure emptying and refilling that bucket is the first thing you do when you get off work and once again before you go to bed. Snow does **NOT** provide an adequate supply of water. Try to set the water where it will be in the sunlight as much of the day as possible. A blanket or two in the dog house may or may not be welcomed. Many a dog lay on their blankets right out in the middle of the yard after the owner carefully folded the blankets just to fit the size of the dog house. Cats are not prepared or built to live outside in the winter. If you wish to help those who do stay outside, get a small cardboard box—just bigger than the cat—wrapped in several layers of plastic garbage bags and duct taped securely so the plastic doesn't flap in the wind, cut a door off to the side and place a small towel in the box. Try to set it out of the wind, preferably where some sun will hit it during the day. Please take a moment to give thought to your animal's quality of life. If you have an animal that you leave outside on a chain or in a fence 24/7...what kind of life does that animal have? What does it have to look forward to on a day to day basis. Ask yourself why you even have an animal. Today's dogs and cats are domesticated and are happiest spending time with people—their family, their pack. Putting a dog outside on a chain or in a pen is almost as abusive as if you beat the animal. Pets are meant to be just that. Pets. A four-legged member of the family. You will reward yourself a thousand times over by making the animal a member of your family who is welcome in your home. A pet, particularly a dog, who is a member of your family is far more likely to come to your aid, defend you, and be a loyal friend. Dogs love us unconditionally, not many people do. If you do not have the time or the desire to make your pet a part of your family do yourself and more importantly the animal a favor and place it in a no-kill shelter such as Help For Homeless Pets in Billings. Public Works Department

Our summer/fall street project on Olive Drive and Castle Rock Lake Drive finished up in early November. I hope everyone enjoys the new streets and sidewalk. No street projects are scheduled for this year. In 2009 Appaloosa, Cheyenne, and Antelope Drives are scheduled for reconstruction; of course, this depends on monies being available in the 2008/2009 general budget.

By the time the spring newsletter is out, the city's rehab project for Lift Station "C" should be started. This is another critical project in order to upgrade the sewage transmission system. The cost to reconstruct was bid at \$270,700. The total cost including engineering is approximately \$325,000. The city did receive a \$100,000 grant from the Montana Coal Board to assist with the cost. The Coal Board is a great resource for the city to apply to in order to help with these types of projects. In the end, it saves all residents money with regards to their current sewer service charges.

As of the first of the year the Public Works Department has put down almost one hundred tons of sand on city streets. The sand does have granular magnesium chloride added to help hurry the melting process.

Sometime later this year the city will be installing a new ultra-violet disinfection system at the Sewage Treatment Plant. This unit will replace the current gaseous chlorine cylinders. After completion the city will have no gaseous chlorine in the system. As I have stated in earlier newsletters this has been a big safety issue for all of our residents.

This spring you will notice a new street sweeper cleaning the streets. The city purchased a new Elgin Broombear.

If you go to the City of Colstrip's official website you will notice on the home page a new weather station. This is a new unit with up to the minute reports on temperature, humidity, wind, barometric pressure, dew point, and rainfall. The weather station is located at the Water Treatment Plant.

I would like to bring up some facts about the quality of water that is distributed to the residents of Colstrip through the city's Water Treatment Plant. Your water is tested by certified laboratories for about every metal, inorganic, and volatile organic compounds that exist. Results are available to all residents anytime during normal business hours. I encourage anyone who may have questions or concerns to stop by or call. All of our sampling results consistently exceed federal and state standards.

The public is always welcome to tour any of the city's public works facilities. Give me a call at city hall to schedule a tour or if you have other questions call 748-2300 ext. 5.

In a recent report to the City Council I noted that there were fifteen (15) new home construction permits issued within the City of Colstrip in the year 2007. Construction permits in general almost doubled from the previous two years. All this new construction must by law meet the International Building Codes adopted by the state.

Building codes have changed over the years. The codes that were in place in the 1970's, when many of the houses within the City of Colstrip were built, have been revised or updated for the safety of the homeowner and the community.

In May of 2007, I was certified as a Residential Building Inspector, so if you are considering an upgrade to your residence, a new deck, out building, or fence please call and discuss your plans with me. My telephone number at city hall is 748-2300 ext. 6. I can help you with the permit process and let you know of possible code changes of which you may be unaware.

I am in my office Monday through Thursday in the afternoons.

Tree Board



The City of Colstrip was awarded the Rocky Mountain Chapter of the International Society of Arboriculture's Gold Leaf Award, in recognition of the city's outstanding Arbor Day celebration. Colstrip was selected from cities across Montana, Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico for this year's award.

Colstrip's Arbor Day celebration included a poster contest sponsored by the local Tree Board, with senior citizens judging; winners received t-shirts provided by PPL Montana. The city also incorporated a clean-up day, offering free garbage pick-up to participating citizens, businesses, and local organizations. PPL Montana donated 1,100 trees for citizens to plant. Western Energy held a presentation on the importance of planting trees on its mine reclamation land. The elementary school provided more than 200 trees for students with educational pamphlets supplied by the city.

This year Colstrip was chosen as the state site to celebrate Arbor Day. DNRC State Forester Bob Harrington was on hand to help with festivities at the Pine Butte Elementary School. Students helped Mr. Harrington plant a tree provided by DNRC on the school grounds. The City of Colstrip also received the Eastern Montana Forestry Excellence Award. We received the award at the yearly Montana League of Cities and Towns Convention. This program has been successful due to the support of and the participation of the school district, local businesses, and our residents. The Tree Board's major project this year is to focus on the beautification of Fireman's Park. Although we are in the planning stages we are very excited about the prospects of this project and others.



Recycling Committee



Mayor Williams convened a meeting with persons interested in recycling efforts in the Colstrip area on 12/12/07. Mayor Williams stated, "the city is recently being charged for the removal of cardboard from the Colstrip recycling area and we feel that there are better ways to benefit the community and increase recycling efforts."

Those present agreed with the Mayor and discussed potential alternatives to the project and ways to increase recycling efforts. Interest has been expressed in additional recycling efforts that include paper, aluminum, and even plastics.


Charlie Brown from the Rosebud County Solid Waste District said that, "the recent cell developed at the Rosebud County Landfill cost approximately \$825,000 and is estimated to last 12 years which amounts to about \$75,000 a year." He felt that if the cardboard could be recycled that it could save two (2) to three (3) years of life on the landfill. Mr. Brown estimated that the landfill receives 8 to 9,000 tons of refuse a year.

Mr. Brown estimated that only approximately 10% of the cardboard is currently recycled within the community. Rick Harbin, Director of Colstrip Parks and Recreation District and city council member, mentioned that education would need to be a key element of a recycling program.



Volunteer Fire Department

Ah, winter, the smells of the holiday seasons are upon us, as well as the smell of coal and wood stoves. With the onslaught of cold temperatures comes the use of stoves to keep the house warm. Everyone loves to snuggle up to a warm fire to cut the chill of winter but these stoves can be dangerous unless taken care of. Please make sure your stoves are cleaned and maintained. Chimney fires can put you out into the cold, literally. Hot ashes can cause lots of problems too, and in Colstrip we typically burn down 2 to 3 garbage cans a year. Stay warm but be careful with fire.

Winter and the New Year is a great time to check your smoke alarm batteries.

The roads are sometimes snowy and icy so please slow down and check your tires.

The Colstrip Volunteer Fire Department is looking for recruits. I know everyone is busy, but I can think of no better use of your time than to help out the community you live in. We ask for 30 hours a year minimum for training. Most of the firemen spend more than that because we maintain vehicles and equipment, put up Christmas lights, set off Colstrip Days fireworks, and are involved in many other community activities. Oh yeah, we also respond to fires and accidents. The fire department is a great group and the cause is a great cause. Give up a little of your couch potato time. Training is fun, I mean where else can you burn, cut up, and blow up things safely. We stress safety and we are proud of our safety record. We are lucky in Colstrip to have excellent equipment.

Be careful and we hope we don't see you. At least not on a fire or accident response.

Community Care Task Force



Over the last eight months, a determined group called the Colstrip Community Care Task Force has been meeting to evaluate and determine the strengths and weaknesses of a proposed elderly care facility in Colstrip.

After this need was identified at a Housing Summit hosted by Southeastern MT Development (SEMDC) in February of 2007, Colstrip Mayor John Williams invited a group of community members to explore opportunities to develop an elderly care facility. Since then, a dedicated task force has formed and is pursuing the challenge of evaluating options to build either an independent living facility (like River Villa in Forsyth) or an assisted living facility (like Ashland's Heritage Center).

Actually, there are numerous elderly care facility projects proposed in this region. Hysham has been working on a project for a few years with two assisted living proposals being developed in Forsyth. The Heritage Assisted Living Center in Ashland has been open for about four years along with the River Villa complex in Forsyth. So why Colstrip, and why now?

"Looks like elderly care facilities could be a growth industry in Eastern Montana," noted Jim Atchison of SEMDC. "Rosebud County alone is projected to see over a 170% increase in the 65 + age group in the next 24 years. The need is here, how do we respond to it?" The Task Force has been busy looking at different ways to structure the project and of course, how to build and operate it.

But first, was there actually a need in Colstrip and would the community support it? The City of Colstrip and the Colstrip Senior Citizens Club have since donated funds to assist with the evaluation process. Blayr Barnard of the Small Business Development Center hosted by SEMDC, created and evaluated a survey to measure public support for such a proposed Colstrip project. "The results were amazing, stated Barnard. "With a 19% return rate (1,050 surveys), 60% said there was a need for both types of facilities and 74% stated that they would financially support such a project."

Since then, SEMDC has been authorized by its Board to apply to the Montana Big Sky Economic Development Trust Fund for feasibility study funds to assist with the major decisions that need to be made. The feasibility study application was approved with stipulations in December. The state will fund up to 70% of the cost of the feasibility study which leaves 30% matching funds open. SEMDC has been working to acquire the difference from the City of Colstrip and Rosebud County. Once the funding is set, SEMDC will advertise a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to the public to complete the Feasibility Study. If all goes as planned, the study will be completed in March. This study will assist the Task Force in what course of action to take to make this dream a reality.

"It might be the natural evolution of "Coal Country" impacts, noted Atchison, "30-35 years ago in Colstrip the big push was for schools and medical facilities. Now its elderly care housing facilities."

The Colstrip Community Care Task Force meets at noon the second and fourth Tuesday at the Colstrip City Hall. The public is always welcome to attend.

It is anticipated that within the year, the city may be working with a private recycling business within the community and a portion of the proceeds from recycled materials could be used to aid community projects within Colstrip.

These efforts are in the planning phases, but there has been a lot of interest in this approach to recycling cardboard, cans, and possibly plastic containers in the future. PPL and Western Energy already are baling and recycling cardboard. Julie Korkow from SouthEastern Montana Development Corporation has reported that the community of Broadus earns over \$5,000 a year on recycling efforts, with the proceeds going toward kids' projects.

The local committee hopes to establish a recycling program in Colstrip that could benefit local youth and community groups. Stay tuned for more on the recycling opportunity.

on the way to the airport to come and meet you.

- (5) You receive foreign business offers or other offers of millions of dollars in inheritance money from complete strangers.
REALITY: Offers come in many varieties, from many countries, but none of the promises will come true. Real companies and government agencies don't contact strangers in other countries to offer business propositions.
- (6) Work-at-home scams that promise easy money working from your residence, or they ask for help processing payments.
REALITY: If it was so easy why wouldn't we all be working in our pajamas. If they ask you to deposit checks and send them their money minus your "pay" you will be finding out too late that the checks they sent you are bogus. Real companies don't do business in this manner.

Many scams that we deal with originate in foreign countries and in the vast majority of the cases the criminal jurisdiction lies with those governments. The Colstrip Police Department passes these reported cases along to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and U.S. Postal Authorities, but there is little to nothing that can be done about it because the perpetrators aren't in territory under U.S. criminal jurisdiction. Did you know for instance that the number two industry in Nigeria is scamming Americans out of their money? The best defense we have is education and smart citizens that recognize these get rich schemes for what they are and don't allow themselves to fall victim. Also remember never to share your banking, credit card, or social security information with these people.

It was November 1998 that the residents voted overwhelmingly that we should become an incorporated city and become recognized with our own identity. Many projects have been completed and significant investments made into our infrastructure that would not have been possible without our city being incorporated. We plan on putting a list together later on this year to identify all the changes that have occurred over the past ten years as an incorporated city.

tirelessly to match appropriate homes with the right animal no matter what behavioral problems the animal may have.

Don't think, "Well it's just a dog" because to someone that dog could be a lifeline, a devoted pet, and a great companion. If you have it outside 24/7 you are treating it no different than livestock.

Remember your animals are totally dependent on you for survival. As an animal owner, you are obligated by Montana law to provide food, water, and shelter. As an animal owner in the City of Colstrip, you are also obligated by the laws of the City of Colstrip to have your animals vaccinated and licensed with the city. The tags aren't expensive and it's the best and fastest way we have of reuniting animal and owner if they get separated.
