Public Works Department

I can't believe we are already half way through winter. For the Public Works Department it has been a typical season. Although we haven't had a great deal of snow but the up and down temperatures have created icy streets that have kept our sander busy much of the time. At the end of January, we have applied 160 tons of sand and deicer to the streets. This year we increased the amount of deicer mixed with the sand and it seems to increase the effectiveness of the sand dramatically. This combination has kept many of the intersections free of ice for much of the season.

The following data is from our weather station at the Water Treatment Plant and includes data from last year for comparison.

Our Water Treatment Plant treated 216.957 million gallons of drinking water in 2015. This is up slightly from our 2014 total of 207 MG. Also in 2015 61.707 MG of domestic wastewater was treated by our Wastewater Treatment Plant. All of the reclaimed wastewater is delivered to CPRD where it is used to irrigate the golf course. The City and CPRD, working together, saved the park district \$158,000 for water.

The Alder Court Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation project was given the green light by City Council last October. This project involved replacement of around 300 feet of sewer main from Alder Court to a manhole in the horse pasture east of the railroad track. The old clay tile line had partially collapsed beneath the railroad track and had caused backup problems in the area. This line carries flow from the original town site and handles about 25% of Colstrip's total flow. The new pipe line was installed in a steel sleeve under the tracks through a boring operation. The line was completed before winter shutdown but there is still some landscaping that will need to be finished in the spring.

The Colstrip WWTP Upgrade Phase 1 is in the preliminary design phase. This project will include the repair of deficiencies identified in the Wastewater PER and includes the building of a second clarifier and a modification to the plant headworks. After review and final design approval by DEQ we should be bidding this project out later this spring/summer with construction hopefully to begin later this year. The second Phase of the planned wastewater upgrades was the repair of the Laramie and Plum Court lift stations and the replacement of the Cherry Street lift station. These upgrades were already completed in the spring of 2015.

The reconstruction of Willow Avenue from Highway 39 to the railroad tracks is in the plan for this year. Since this street is the first thing people see when they come to town we are also looking at some beautification options. The plan is to begin construction later this year.

Colstrip #1 Safest City in Montana

Safewise.com has named Colstrip the safest city in Montana!

Each month we submit crime data and reports to the state through NIBRS (National Incident Based Reporting System) by way of our SWIFT Justice Software. The State in turn compiles all data from reporting agencies throughout the year and forwards the information to the FBI. This annual data is analyzed to determine each agencies crime rate as well as the State of Montana's overall rate.

The list of the 10 safest cities in Montana is based off the overall data for the Montana cities with a population of over 1500 residents.

Colstrip has a very low rate of violent crime with a chance of a violent crime occurring of .88 out of 1000 people or residents. Colstrip's property crime rate is 6.18 per 1000 people or residents.

Though our employee's involvement within the community and proactive approach to law enforcement played a big part in this recent rating, we cannot take all of the credit for it. Colstrip is comprised, as you well know, of a great group of residents who take pride in our community and who respect the rights and property of their neighbors and others, creating a "family" atmosphere throughout the community.

Though our community is not entirely without crime, working together with our community and residents has ensured that it is kept to a very minimal rate.

Our success would also not be possible without the support of previous and current City leadership. The Mayor and Council members have always ensured that we are adequately trained and equipped to handle issues as they arise. By supporting our training and equipment requests they have allowed us to become in my opinion, one of the best small agencies within the state!

We thank all of you for your support and ask for your continued support in the upcoming years as we work together toward the same common goal; fostering a safe community for all our residents, children and visitors alike!
